# EMPIRE VS BRIGADE

## MATCHUP PREVIEW

Coming off a heartbreaking last-second loss to visiting Philadelphia, the Albany Empire hit the road for an away matchup against the Baltimore Brigade on Saturday, June 23 at 7:30 p.m. at the Royal Farms Arena. A win for Albany would give the Empire the tiebreaker over Baltimore in the event that the two teams finish even in the standings. The game will be broadcast live on CBS Sports Network and on Alt 105.7 fm.

The first matchup to look out for is between the Empire secondary versus Brandon Thompkins. Thompkins was seemingly the only receiver in the building catching passes from Hippeard two weeks ago when the two teams played. The speedy wideout hauled in a whopping 17 catches, just three shy of tying the record for most ever in a single game. His 17 receptions went for 159 yards and three touchdowns as he was the clear favorite target for Hippeard all night long. On the season, Thompkins is third in the league in receptions and has nearly twice as many catches as the next closest receiver on the Baltimore team. The Empire secondary will need to lock him down if they want a chance to limit the Brigade's dangerous offense and come away with a win on the road.

The next matchup to lookout for involves the same Baltimore player, but in the special teams game. On the season, Brandon Thompkins leads the league in kick return yards and average yards per return. He has also taken one kick off to the house for a Baltimore score. Special teams play a huge role in any arena football game, but if Thompkins is able to create space on returns, he could set up the Brigade with great field position on every possession. Two weeks ago against Albany, Thompkins was limited to just four returns, but did take one of them 28 yards. Expect Albany to mix in some onside and squib kicks to keep the ball out of Thompkins' hands in the return game while also trying to recover the ball back for a quick turnover.

The final matchup to watch is between the Empire's dynamic duo of receivers against the Brigade secondary. The combo of Joe Hills and Malachi Jones have been dominant all year, but against the Brigade, the two have stepped up a notch. In the most recent matchup, Hills and Jones combined for 225 yards and six receiving touchdowns. Jones leads the league in receiving yards while his teammate sits in third. The two are first and second in the league in receiving touchdowns and have proven that either of them can score on any play from scrimmage. How does Baltimore stop them? Simply put, they can't, but no one has all year long. Expect the Brigade to mix in more onside kicks to try to steal possessions away from the Empire. If they can recover and onside kick or two, that will swing momentum in favor of Baltimore and keep the ball away from the league's top receiving unit. If they fail to recover any onside attempts, expect to hear "touchdown Empire" often in this one as Hills and Jones make a living in the end zone once again.

## MILESTONES:

**Notable Empire players who have reached milestones this season...**

- \* Surpassing 34,000 career passing yards last week, quarterback Tommy Grady is now ranked 8<sup>th</sup> all-time in passing yards and 7<sup>th</sup> all-time in passing touchdowns.
- \* Wide Receiver Joe Hills is now ranked 10<sup>th</sup> all-time in touchdown receptions eclipsing 250 in his career.
- \* Defensive end Joe Sykes is currently tied for the all-time league lead in career sacks with 60.5.

## BALTIMORE TIES

- \* Current Albany defensive back Varmah Sonie was a member of the Baltimore Brigade during their inaugural 2017 campaign, racking up six interceptions while being named to the second All-Arena team.

## OPPOSING PLAYERS TO WATCH

Look out for Brigade quarterback Randy Hippeard. Earning his seventh Game MVP honor of the season in last week's 72-42 rout over Washington, Hippeard threw for five touchdown passes. Hippeard leads the league in completion percentage with a 71.9 success rate and is ranked second overall in passing yards and passing touchdowns. In the Brigade's last matchup against Albany, Hippeard threw for 270 yards and an impressive eight touchdowns.

Another offensive weapon that will be showcased for Baltimore is wide receiver Brandon Thompkins. Thompkins has receiving 587 yards and 10 touchdown receptions on the season. During week 9, Thompkins had a game-high 17 receptions against the Empire.

# THE COACHES

## ALBANY EMPIRE HEAD COACH ROB KEEFE

Keefe enters his ninth season as a coach in the AFL. At the age of 29 he became the youngest head coach in AFL history to win an Arena Football League Championship, when he led the Spokane Shock to an ArenaBowl victory in their first year in the AFL. He is the only person in Arena Football history to win an Arena Cup (AF2) and ArenaBowl (AFL) title as both a player and a coach.

As a player, Keefe was a defensive back. During his playing days, he set team records for the Spokane Shock as their all time leader in tackles and interceptions. Making the transition from AF2 to AFL, Keefe joined the Philadelphia Soul, where he won a championship in 2008.

Keefe's first season as a head coach, the Spokane Shock boasted the league's top-ranked defense, allowing a mere 37.6 points per game. The shock won an ArenaCup in that same season.

Coming into the 2018 season, Keefe posted a career 61-30 record as a head coach in the AFL (#1). Most recently, he led the Orlando Predators as head coach and vice president of football operations from 2014-2016. In his stint in Orlando, Rob won a division championship in each of his three years leading the team.

## BALTIMORE BRIGADE HEAD COACH OMARR SMITH

Smith enters his second season as Head Coach of the Brigade after being named the franchise's first Head Coach in December of 2016. Despite posting a 4-10 record in Baltimore's inaugural season, Smith led the Brigade to a playoff appearance.

Smith had a long and successful playing career in the AFL. As a defensive back, Smith played two stints with the San Jose SaberCats (2000-2002, 2004-2008) and a year with the Tampa Bay Storm (2003). As a player, Smith compiled four total ArenaBowl championships including over 30 career interceptions and more than 350 total tackles. Smith sits at number two for all-time interceptions for San Jose. In 2014, Smith's storied playing career earned him an induction into the Arena Football Hall of Fame.

Smith earned his first role of Head Coach with the LA KISS in 2016, leading the team to a playoff appearance with a 7-9 record. Before coaching in LA, Smith spent time as an assistant coach with the Arkansas Twisters, Arizona Rattlers, and San Jose SaberCats from 2009-2015. Smith is a three-time ArenaBowl champion as an assistant coach, tied all-time for most ArenaBowl championships with seven combined as a player and a coach.

# EMPIRE PLAYMAKERS

**Tommy Grady**



Tommy Grady had another big game last Saturday in which he tallied 18 completions for 335 yards and a season-high 10 touchdown passes. Grady leads the league in TD passes (59) and passing yards (2266).

**Joe Hills**



Joe Hills reeled in 9 catches for 134 yards and 3 touchdowns last Saturday, totaling his career touchdown mark to 253. **Hills has scored a receiving touchdown in 89 consecutive games.**

**Malachi Jones**



Malachi Jones was a lethal presence for the Empire last Saturday, hauling in 7 passes for 177 yards and an impressive 5 touchdown receptions. Jones also scored a rushing touchdown, his fifth of the season.

**Derrick Summers**



Earning the honor of Defensive Player of the Game last Saturday, Derrick Summers was a menace to the Philadelphia offense with 4.5 tackles and a crucial sack.

**Joe Sykes**



Defensive end Joe Sykes leads the league in sacks with 7.0. Entering this weekend's contest, **Sykes is tied for the all-time AFL record in sacks with 60.5**

**Terence Moore**



Ranked second in the league in total tackles with 52.5, Terence Moore led the Empire defense last Saturday with 5.5 tackles. Moore is a league-leader in interceptions with 4.

# EMPIRE LEADERS

**WHAT'S AT STAKE:** The Albany Empire look to rebound from dropping consecutive home results during the past two weeks. With the two sides clashing for the third time in the past four weeks, Albany will strive to hand the surging Brigade their first loss at home this season.

**LEADING THE WAY: QB Tommy Grady** is one of the most dangerous offensive weapons in the AFL. Grady leads the league in touchdown passes (59), passing yards (2,266), and yards per game for QBs who have played in at least four games (251.8). During last week's game, Grady surpassed 34,000 career passing yards- a mark that puts him eighth all-time in the AFL.

**WHO CAN COVER ME? WR Joe Hills** was on the receiving end of three touchdown passes a week ago against the defending champs. Hills now has 253 career touchdown receptions, leaving him ranked 10<sup>th</sup> all-time in the AFL. A touchdown pass against the Brigade would make it 90 straight games of receiving a touchdown pass for Hills answering the initial question that nobody can cover him.

**TOUCHDOWN MACHINE: WR Malachi Jones** has been the other half of the Empire's dynamic receiving duo all year. Leading the league in receiving yards with 890, Jones has averaged 15.1 yards per reception, also a league-best. Jones is also a dangerous weapon in the red zone as he has compiled five rushing touchdowns so far this season. Expect another breakout game from Jones as he strides to build his case for rookie of the year.

**THE SILENT ASSASSIN: MLB Derrick Summers** may not say much, but he is a force from the Mac linebacker position on the field. In a game with little defense to talk about, Summers had 4.5 total tackles including a sack. In his career, Summers ranks in the top ten all-time in the league for sacks and proves to be a pivotal part of a defense that continues to lead the league in most statistical categories.

**THE DISTINGUISHED GENTLEMAN: WR Greg Carr** earned the nickname of "the distinguished gentleman" for being one of the most laid back and polite players on the roster. The veteran wideout has been one of Grady's top red zone targets on the season as all of his touchdowns have come from within 10-yards of pay dirt. Don't be surprised to see a fade to Carr in the corner of the end zone only for him to spear it out of midair with one hand and come down for the score.

## Empire Lose Heartbreaker to Soul

6/16/2018

The Albany Empire (5-4) was defeated by the Philadelphia Soul (5-4) 75-74 Saturday night at the Times Union Center in Albany, NY in front of a crowd of 9,534. Soul receiver Aaron Wascha caught 12 passes for 208 yards and seven receiving touchdowns earning himself the game MVP award. Empire receiver Malachi Jones had 7 receptions for 177 yards, five receiving touchdowns and one rushing touchdown on his way to being named Offensive Player of the Game. Empire mac linebacker Derrick Summers was named Defensive Player of the Game 4.5 total tackles and one sack.

The Empire received the opening kickoff and began the game on the five-yard line after a short return by Jordan Williams. After failing to connect on a bomb to receiver Joe Hills, Tommy Grady hit receiver Malachi Jones for a 45-yard touchdown to give the Empire an early 7-0 lead. Philadelphia took the ensuing kickoff to the 14-yard line and went to work on their first drive of the game. After an incomplete pass, defensive end Joe Sykes was able to apply pressure, but couldn't bring down Soul quarterback Shane Austin who scrambled across midfield for a 15-yard gain. The next play, Philadelphia was in the red zone as Austin connected with the league's leader in receiving yards, Darius Prince. Three plays later, Austin hooked up with Prince in the end zone for the short score to tie the game.

The Soul attempted an onside kick, but failed to recover it, setting up the Empire on the opposing 10-yard line. After an encroachment penalty on Philadelphia, Grady found Joe Hills from five yards out for the quick score. Hills' trip to the end zone marked the 89th consecutive game of his career with a receiving touchdown; an active league record.

Philadelphia took over on their own 15-yard line after a nice kick return by Poppy Livers. The Soul were across midfield on the first play of the drive as Austin went right back to Prince. After making it to the red zone, the Soul were setback thanks to a sack by defensive end Nick Seither. One play later, Austin found Aaron Wascha to get down to the Empire three-yard line. Philadelphia was quickly backed up because of an offensive pass interference play, but Austin found Prince on the next play for the score to tie the game at 14.

Albany went back to work on their on 12-yard line as the first quarter came to an end. With the first play of the second quarter, Grady found Hills down field to set the Empire up on the opposing seven-yard line. After Albany successfully overturned a fumble call, Malachi Jones ran the ball in from four-yards out for the score. The Soul returned the ensuing kickoff to the two-yard line and two plays later, Austin connected with Wascha for the 48-yard touchdown to once again tie the game.

Due to a holding penalty on the Empire return, the Albany offense went back out to the field starting on their own three-yard line. After an illegal contact penalty on Philadelphia and two completions to Hills, the Empire were quickly across midfield. One play later, Grady found Hills in the end zone once again as he bobbled the ball but secured it for the score. Albany would then attempt an onside kick but failed to recover, setting Philadelphia up on the six-yard line. Three plays later, Austin found Wascha once again for the score.

After another failed onside kick attempt by the Soul, Albany went back to work in the red zone on the seven-yard line. One play after the one-minute warning, Grady found receiver Greg Carr for the short score. The Empire then attempted an onside kick of their own but failed to recover, giving the Soul the ball back on the Albany 15-yard line. After a defensive pass interference, Philadelphia inched down to the six-yard line after a short rush by Austin. Albany used three timeouts on consecutive plays as the Soul ran the ball down to the four-yard line to set up a fourth and goal situation, but Philadelphia was able to cap the drive off with a touchdown to Wascha; his third of the quarter. The Empire offense took the field with a mere 21 seconds remaining in the first half with no timeouts. Making quick work, Albany was across midfield thanks to catches from Hills and Jones who were both able to get out of bounds. Grady was then able to connect with Jones from 14-yards out for the Empire touchdown, leaving just five seconds on the clock before halftime. The Empire took a 41-34 lead into the half.

Albany recovered the Soul's onside kick attempt and were quickly in the red zone threatening once again. Two plays later, Grady hit Carr on a fade in the corner of the end zone for the Empire touchdown pushing Albany to 74 points; the most points scored by any team on the season. After a short rushing attempt and two incomplete passes, the Soul were quickly forced into a fourth down and seven situation. Unable to pick up the yardage, Albany took over on downs in the red zone on the nine-yard line. After running down some clock, the Empire failed to get into the end zone, turning the ball over on downs back to the Soul. Within two plays, Philadelphia was across midfield and threatening once again. One play later, Austin found Wascha once again for his seventh receiving touchdown of the game.

The Soul recovered the ensuing onside kick and took over on their own 12-yard line down by five. After pushing across midfield in two plays, the Soul were threatening once again with little time left on the clock. From the 10-yard line, Austin took a shot at the end zone that fell incomplete leaving less than one second on the clock. On the following play, Austin rolled out and found Prince for the 10-yard score as time expired.

The Albany Empire (5-3) was defeated by the Baltimore Brigade (6-2) 59-56 Saturday night at the Times Union Center in Albany, NY in front of a crowd of 8,767. Brigade quarterback Randy Hippeard threw for 270 yards and eight touchdowns earning himself the game MVP award. Brigade receiver Brandon Thompkins had 17 receptions for 159 yards and three receiving touchdowns on his way to being named Offensive Player of the Game. Empire defensive back Brandon Stephens was named Defensive Player of the Game leading both teams with 11.5 total tackles

Albany received the game's opening kickoff and were setup on their own 11-yard line after a nice return by Larry Beavers. Grady went right to work finding the league's leader in receiving yards Malachi Jones on a short pass to the side for a 9-yard pick up. On the next play, Grady went right back to Jones and picked up 21 yards as the Empire were quickly in the opposing red zone. One play later, Grady found Jones once again from 10-yards out as the Albany took the early 7-0 lead. After a high kick off the net, Baltimore went to work on their own nine-yard line for their first possession of the game. ## Empire Snap Soul's 20-Game Home Win Streak

The Albany Empire (3-2) defeated the Philadelphia Soul (3-2) 41-36 Saturday night at the Wells Fargo Center in Philadelphia, PA in front of a crowd of 9,715. The big win for the Empire broke the Soul's active streak of 20 consecutive wins at home. Empire quarterback Tommy Grady threw for 178 yards and five touchdowns earning himself the game MVP award. Empire receiver Malachi Jones had seven receptions for 63 yards and two receiving touchdowns, while chipping one rushing touchdown and earning himself Offensive Player of the Game for the second straight week. Soul's James Romain was named Defensive Player of the Game with eight total tackles and an interception.

The Soul received the initial kick and began their drive at their own five-yard line by opening with a 16-yard connection from Raudabaugh to Reynolds. Two plays later, the Soul found the end zone on a 27-yard hookup to Darius Prince to jump out to an early 7-0 lead.

Albany began their ensuing possession on their own five-yard line after a touchback on the kickoff. After a short completion to Joe Hills, the Empire were helped by a pass interference on fourth down to extend the drive. The drive was stalled by an interception by defensive back James Romaine on a pass intended for Hills in the end zone. Three plays into the Soul drive, Raudabaugh was hit hard by a swarm of Empire defensive linemen and was temporarily knocked out of the game, leaving backup quarterback Greg McGhee to handle the next play. After giving up a sack to Empire lineman Nick Seither, Raudabaugh returned to the game. The Soul failed to convert on fourth down, turning the ball back over to Albany. At the end of the first quarter, Philadelphia led the defensive battle 7-0.

With the first play of the second quarter, the Empire were setback by an intentional grounding penalty on third down and were unable to convert on a long fourth down to give the ball back over to the Soul. Philadelphia worked quickly as they crossed into Empire territory in just two plays. Unable to convert another first down, the Soul attempted a long 46 field goal. The field goal was no good and returned by Empire receiver Collin Taylor to the five-yard line, but thanks to a Soul penalty, the Empire began their drive from the 15-yard line. Two plays later, Grady connected with Malachi Jones for a 30-yard touchdown to tie the game at 7-7.

Albany wasted no time after another Soul score as Grady connected with Jones for his second touchdown reception of the half to give the Empire a 14-13 lead. The Empire then failed to recover an onside kick of their own, setting up the Soul on the Albany 12-yard line. The Soul would take advantage of the short field by taking back the lead on a 27-yard field goal. With little time on the clock, the Empire couldn't find a way to score, with the first half ending 16-14 in favor of the Soul.

Albany would begin their second possession of the second half on their own 20-yard line after the Soul kickoff went out of bounds outside of the nets. Two plays later, Grady connected with Jordan Williams for a 25-yard touchdown; the first touchdown reception of Williams' young AFL career. The first play of the Soul's next possession ended with a fumble by fullback Adrian Ferns, giving the ball back to the Empire inside of the Soul 5-yard line. Defensive end Joe Sykes forced the fumble giving him a league leading four forced fumbles on the season. The Empire capitalized on the Soul turnover with a one-yard touchdown run by Malachi Jones to further the Albany lead. At the end of the third quarter, the Empire led 35-23.

To end the game, the Empire took over on the opposing six-yard line after a failed onside kick by the Soul with just under two minutes to go in the game. ## Empire Spoil Valor's Home Opener

The Albany Empire (2-2) defeated the Washington Valor (0-4) 53-42, Friday night at the Capital One Arena in Washington, D.C. in front of a crowd of 9,036. Empire quarterback Tommy Grady threw for 257 yards and seven touchdowns earning himself the game MVP award. Empire receiver Malachi Jones had six receptions for 120 yards and three receiving touchdowns, while chipping one rushing touchdown and earning himself Offensive Player of the Game. Terence Moore was named Defensive Player of the Game with six total tackles and a fumble recovery.

The Empire received the opening kick and began their drive just inside the 10-yard line. With the first play of the game, Grady found Malachi Jones for a 41-yard bomb and a touchdown giving the Empire an early 6-0 lead. The Valor's Chris Duvalt returned the ensuing kickoff to nearly midfield, giving the Valor excellent field position for their first drive in their home opener. Three plays later, Valor quarterback Warren Smith connected with wide receiver TT Toliver for the score.

Grady found Jones for a quick first down to open the team's second drive of the game. After a few Valor penalties and a couple of hookups between Grady and his top target Joe Hills, the Empire were able to cap the long drive off with three-yard touchdown to a wide-open Greg Carr.

The Empire attempted to surprise the Valor with an onside kick, however the try was unsuccessful, giving the Valor the ball on the Albany nine-yard line. The Valor were able to capitalize on the short field position with another touchdown to Toliver to end the first quarter with the lead, 14-12.

In response, the Empire opened the second quarter with a quick-hitter to Joe Hills that moved the ball to midfield. The very next play, Grady connected with Jones for a 19-yard touchdown; Jones' second of the game. The Valor were able to keep the back and forth pace up with the Empire as they marched down the field and ended with a 21-yard touchdown to Duvalt.

After a nice kickoff return by Jordan Williams, the Empire were set up on their own 15-yard line. Two plays later, Grady found a wide-open Collin Taylor in the end zone from 19 yards out, giving the lead back to Albany, 26-21. The Empire once again attempted an onside kick but failed to recover, setting up the Valor on the Albany 5-yard line. The very next play, the Valor scored on a 5-yard touchdown run by Warren Smith.

With under two minutes to go the Empire went to work inside of their own five-yard line. Two plays later, Grady found Hills for a long completion as Hills smartly stayed out of the end zone to keep the clock running. The Empire capped the drive with a two-yard rushing touchdown by Malachi Jones: his third touchdown of the half. At the end of the first half, the Empire led 32-28.

The Valor began the second half with the ball and were able to methodically work down field, but the drive stalled inside of the Empire 5-yard line and turned the ball over on downs. With 45 yards of turf ahead of them the Empire picked up where they left off by finding Malachi Jones for a completion over the middle. The next play, Grady connected with Jones for a short pass, but Jones was able to make some elusive moves and make his way into the end zone for his fourth total score of the night.

The next Valor possession began with a quick pass, but a Valor penalty brought the offense back inside of their own 10-yard line. Washington worked the ball with ease and ended the drive with a five-yard touchdown pass to receiver Josh Reese. The Valor attempted to get the ball back with an onside kick, but failed, giving the ball to the Empire on the short side of the field. The Empire took a knee and watched the clock wind down on their way to a 53-42 victory.

## Empire Routs Valor 47-23

5/5/2018

The Albany Empire (1-2) won their first game in franchise history against the Washington Valor (0-3) 47-23, Saturday night at the Times Union Center in front of a crowd of 10,065 wearing orange. Empire quarterback Tommy Grady threw for five touchdowns on his way to winning the game MVP award. Valors's Rod Windsor caught the two of the three Washington touchdown passes earning Offensive Player of the Game. Marrio Norman was named Defensive Player of the Game with two interceptions and a touchdown.

Albany receiving the opening kickoff and instantly found receiver Joe Hills on the first play of the game for a first down. On just the third play of the drive, Quarterback Tommy Grady threw a 25-yard floater that looked like it was intercepted, but the ball bobbed up into the hands of Hills for the touchdown. With the score, Joe Hills extended his record of consecutive games with a touchdown reception to 83.

To answer, the Washington Valor methodically drove the ball down the field. On fourth down in the red zone, Valor quarterback Warren Smith found Washington's top target Rod Windsor for the score. On the ensuing possession, Grady found Collin Taylor for a long catch-and-run hookup, but after being tackled from behind, Taylor fumbled the ball into the end zone for a Valor touchback. After the quarter break, the Valor were unable to capitalize and turned the ball over on downs thanks to a sack by defensive end, Joe Sykes.

After a penalty on Washington and a few short completions, Grady was able to find rookie receiver Malachi Jones on a short pass that he broke for a 14-yard touchdown. That touchdown marked the third touchdown in as many games for the rookie.

Starting on their own 1-yard line on the following possession, the Valor were helped by a series of Empire penalties that slowly moved the ball down the field. Washington was able to capitalize on the penalties and cap the drive off with an 8-yard touchdown to Windsor, his second of the game. The extra point attempt was blocked but recovered by the Valor for a two-point conversion, giving them the lead 15-14.

After Valor kickoff went out of bounds, the Empire received the ball with great starting field position at the 20-yard line. Albany easily worked the ball down the field finishing the drive with a four-yard fade to Hills for his second touchdown reception of the game.

The Empire surprised Washington with an onside kick that was recovered by Malachi Jones, giving Albany the ball with a minute remaining in the first half. The offense milked some clock while at the same time making their way down field thanks to two catches by Hills and a Valor penalty. The Empire controlled the ball down to the one-yard line as time was about to expire before Malachi Jones capped the drive off with a short touchdown run giving the Empire the lead 28-15 at the half.

The first play of the second half, Valor quarterback Warren Smith was intercepted by Marrio Norman, who ran it back for a touchdown. The Valor's next possession ended with another turnover on a strip sack by Willie McGinnis, giving the ball back to the Empire on the short side of midfield. Beginning on the Valor 20-yard line, the Empire took their time as they moved down field and capped the drive with a five-yard hookup from Grady to Hills.

The Empire capitalized working their offense before finishing the drive with a pass off the net, caught by Collin Taylor in the end zone for the score, furthering the Empire lead 47-15.

The Albany Empire (0-2) played the team's first game on the road in Baltimore and left with a loss to the Baltimore Brigade (2-1) 52-49, Saturday night at the Royal Farms Arena. Brigade quarterback Randy Hippeard threw for seven touchdowns on his way to winning the game MVP award. Empire's Joe Hills caught four touchdown passes in his debut, earning Offensive Player of the Game. Virgil Gray was named Defensive Player of the Game with ten tackles and an interception.

The Empire offense was led by quarterback Tommy Grady, who threw for six touchdowns. His top target, Joe Hills, caught four of those touchdown passes from Grady. Malachi Jones and Collin Taylor chipped in receiving touchdowns of their own as well.

Baltimore received the first kick and started inside of their own 5-yard line. Reigning league MVP Hippeard took the field for the first time against the Empire and led the Brigade to a score, finishing with a 34-yard touchdown to Milton Williams on third down.

## Soul Defeats Empire 56-35 in Albany's Inaugural Game

The Albany Empire (0-1) opened their inaugural season with a loss to the Philadelphia Soul (1-0), 56-35, Saturday night in front of a sold-out crowd at the Times Union Center. Soul quarterback Dan Raudabaugh, threw for six touchdowns on his way to winning the Offensive Player of the Game award. Torez Jones was named Defensive Player of the Game with five tackles, a fumble recovery and an interception.

The Empire offense was led by quarterback Tommy Grady, who tossed for 259 yards and five touchdowns. His top target Greg Carr, caught eight passes from Grady, tallying for 74 yards and two touchdowns.

Philadelphia came out firing on all cylinders. After returning the opening kickoff to nearly midfield, the Soul marched their way into the end zone, capping off their drive with a seven-yard touchdown to wide receiver Shaun Kauleinamoku.
