EMPIRE VS BRIGADE

MATCHUP PREVIEW

Riding a five-game win streak, the Albany Empire matchup against the familiar and revenge-seeking Baltimore Brigade at home on Saturday, June 9 at 7:30 p.m. at the Times Union Center. The Empire will look to win their sixth consecutive game as they face a surging first place Baltimore team who leads Albany in the standings by one game. The game will be broadcast live on CBS Sports Network and on Alt 105.7 fm.

The first matchup to look out for is between Grady against the Baltimore secondary. Grady has been a terror to opposing defenses all season and has the numbers to prove it. He currently leads the league in passing yards with 1,653 and passing touchdowns with 42. He has been especially brilliant against the Brigade in the two meetings this season. The Empire gunslinger has a combined 14 passing touchdowns in both games against Baltimore. The Brigade simply have no answer for Grady and will have to rely on their potent offense to keep pace with the Empire if they want to come out of Albany with a win. Expect another big game out of the league's top quarterback as he continues to torch the Brigade backfield.

The next matchup to look out for is between the Empire defensive backfield against the Brigade receivers. Baltimore has four receivers with at least 20 catches and six touchdowns so far on the season as Hippeard has spread the ball out and found the open man all year long. Though all four of these receivers found the end zone at least once a week ago, none of them eclipsed the 100 receiving yard mark. The key to victory in this matchup is to force turnovers. Last week, the Empire defense had an interception, forced four fumbles, and even scored a touchdown. Both meetings this season have come down to which team forces the turnovers. Baltimore's offense is extremely potent and can score on any play proving that covering their four big receivers is a tall order for any defense. Hippeard can go punch-for-punch with Grady all night long, so it will be up to the Empire defense to come up with a big play and shift momentum in favor of Albany.

The last matchup to look out for is between the Empire kickoff team versus Brigade kick returner Brandon Thompkins. Last week Thompkins returned seven kicks for 127 yards including a 30-yarder. Thompkins has the ability to break any return to the house, but as the uncanny ability to pick up a big chunk of yards even if it looks like he has no running room. If Thompkins is able to continue to run back Empire kickoffs for big yards, then the Brigade offense will have the advantage of a shorter field. Last week right before halftime, Thompkins ran one out of the end zone to nearly the 20-yard line and thanks to an Empire penalty, the Brigade were able to kick a field goal as time expired. Albany needs to find a way to limit the return yardage and contain Thompkins from breaking out into open field.

THE IFS:

If the Empire defeats the Brigade it would...

- * Extend the Empire win streak to six games
- * Improve Albany's record to a league-best 6-2
- * Give Albany the advantage in the season series against Baltimore (currently tied 1-1)

BALTIMORE TIES

- * None of the current Empire coaches have coached in Baltimore.
- * Varmah Sonie is the only player on the Empire's 24-man roster to have played for the Brigade. In 2017, Sonie had 68 tackles, 20 pass breakups, four interceptions and a touchdown while playing in Baltimore.

OPPOSING PLAYERS TO WATCH

Look out for Brigade receiver Brandon Collins. A week ago against Albany, Collins led the way with nine catches, 77 yards and two touchdowns. On the season, Collins has tallied 33 catches for 334 yards and seven touchdowns.

Hippeard likes to spread the ball around to all of his weapons with four receivers extremely active in the Brigade offense. The former league MVP will be perfectly content to scan the entire field and not force anything. Look for Hippeard to feed receiver Brandon Thompkins. On the season, Thompkins leads the team in receptions (41), and yards (382). Aside from being the team's top receiver, Thompkins has been great all year setting Baltimore up with big kick returns.

THE COACHES

ALBANY EMPIRE HEAD COACH ROB KEEFE

Keefe enters his ninth season as a coach in the AFL. At the age of 29 he became the youngest head coach in AFL history to win an Arena Football League Championship, when he led the Spokane Shock to an ArenaBowl victory in their first year in the AFL. He is the only person in Arena Football history to win an Arena Cup (AF2) and ArenaBowl (AFL) title as both a player and a coach.

As a player, Keefe was a defensive back. During his playing days, he set team records for the Spokane Shock as their all time leader in tackles and interceptions. Making the transition from AF2 to AFL, Keefe joined the Philadelphia Soul, where he won a championship in 2008.

Keefe's first season as a head coach, the Spokane Shock boasted the league's top-ranked defense, allowing a mere 37.6 points per game. The shock won an ArenaCup in that same season.

Coming into the 2018 season, Keefe posted a career 61-30 record as a head coach in the AFL (#1). Most recently, he led the Orlando Predators as head coach and vice president of football operations from 2014-2016. In his stint in Orlando, Rob won a division championship in each of his three years leading the team.

BALTIMORE BRIGADE HEAD COACH OMARR SMITH

Smith is one of the most successful players and coaches in AFL history, earning a combined seven AFL championships. Named to the Arena Football Hall of Fame for his storied playing career, Smith enters his second season as the Brigade's head coach. Baltimore qualified for the playoffs in the team's inaugural season, falling to the eventual-champion Philadelphia Soul in the semifinals.

Prior to joining the Brigade coaching staff, Smith spent one season (2016) as the head coach of the LA KISS, earning a home playoff appearance after finishing second in the National Conference. As an assistant coach, Smith won an ArenaBowl title with the Arizona Rattlers in 2012 and 2013 and with the San Jose SaberCats in 2015. Smith won Assistant Coach of the Year in 2013 with the Arizona Rattlers as the team's defensive coordinator. In 2012 and 2013, the Rattlers won consecutive ArenaBowl Championships with a defense ranked second in points allowed per game every season Smith led the defensive unit.

During his nine-year playing career, Smith won four ArenaBowl titles (2002, 2003, 2004, 2007) and finished his career with 35 interceptions, 88 pass break-ups and eight defensive touchdowns.

EMPIRE PLAYMAKERS

Tommy Grady



Tommy Grady earned the game MVP last Saturday by tallying 19 completions on 30 attempts for a total of 248 yards and 8 touchdowns. On the season, Grady has totaled 1,653 yards and 48 touchdowns, both league-bests.

Joe Hills



Joe Hills was a key offensive presence for the Empire last week in which he caught 7 catches for 60 yards and 3 touchdowns. **Hills has scored a receiving touchdown in 87 consecutive games.**

Malachi Jones



Earning Offensive Player of the Game a week ago, Malachi Jones reeled in 8 catches for 133 yards and 3 touchdowns. Jones is at the top of the league in receiving yards with 620 and second in receiving touchdowns at 13.

Brandon Stephens



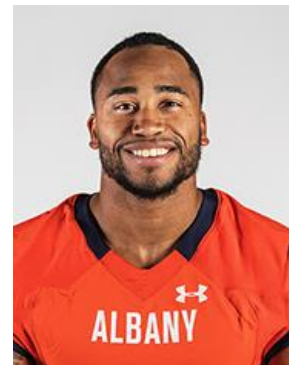
Brandon Stephens stepped up for the Empire defense after an early exit for Arthur Hobbs. Stephens was third on the team with 4.0 total tackles and recovered a fumble.

Marrio Norman



Marrio Norman is currently second in the AFL with 43 total tackles. Last Saturday, he had a team-high 7.0 tackles in the Empire victory over Baltimore.

Terence Moore



Terence Moore led the way for the Empire defense last Saturday with 3.5 tackles, an interception, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery.

EMPIRE LEADERS

WHAT'S AT STAKE: The Albany Empire look to continue their five-game win streak while having sole possession of first place for the first time this season. Since a Week 3 loss to Baltimore, the Empire have turned it up as the team finds itself in a position to defeat Baltimore in consecutive weeks at home.

AT THE HELM: QB Tommy Grady has been on fire for the Empire during the team's winning streak. Against the Brigade last week, Grady threw for 248 yards and eight touchdowns, earning himself the game's MVP honor. Grady currently leads the AFL in touchdown passes (48) and passing yards (1653) entering this pivotal matchup with Baltimore.

SIMPLY UNCOVERABLE: WR Joe Hills seemingly lives in the end zone. In last Saturday's Empire victory, Hills put on yet another stellar performance with seven catches for 60 yards and three touchdowns. Hills added to his dominant season totals as he leads the AFL in receiving touchdowns with 16, not to mention a streak of 87 consecutive games played with a receiving touchdown- a **streak that is still active.**

PICK YOUR POISON: WR Malachi Jones has been the other half of the Empire's dynamic duo all year. Leading the league in receiving yards (620) and second in receiving touchdowns (13), he serves as another dominant weapon for Grady to find. On the season, he has 16 total touchdowns, tied for the Empire lead with teammate Joe Hills. Earning the Offensive Player of the Game last Saturday, Jones scored an explosive 44-yard receiving touchdown in the first play from scrimmage to give the Empire an immediate advantage in the game. It's safe to assume that Jones will be seen in the opposing end zone at least once in the battle for sole possession of first place against the Brigade.

SUPER MARRIO: DB Marrio Norman has been a crucial factor to an Empire defense that has begun to dominant opposing offenses. In last Saturday's win, Norman led the Empire in tackles with 7.0, improving his season total to 43- a number that ranks second in the AFL. Norman has two interceptions on the season and will prove to be a menace to Baltimore's offense once again this week. Norman has been a pivotal part of a defense that leads the league in just about every category as the team has surrendered a mere 35 points per game during the five-game win streak.

Empire Claim a Share of First Place

6/2/2018

The Albany Empire (5-2) defeated the Baltimore Brigade (5-2) 61-53 Saturday night at the Times Union Center in Albany, NY in front of a crowd of 8,057. Empire quarterback Tommy Grady threw for 248 yards and eight touchdowns earning himself the game MVP award. Empire receiver Malachi Jones had eight receptions for 133 yards and three receiving touchdowns on his way to being named Offensive Player of the Game. Empire's jack linebacker Terence Moore was named Defensive Player of the Game for the second straight week with 4.5 total tackles, a forced fumble and an interception.

Albany received the opening kickoff and went to work on their own six-yard line. On the first play from scrimmage, quarterback Tommy Grady hit receiver Malachi Jones over the middle who then broke a tackle and took it to the house for a 44-yard touchdown for the early lead. The Brigade took the field on the 20-yard line after a nice return by Brandon Thompkins. After one play, Randy Hippeard found receiver Quentin Sims for a short pass and the Brigade were across midfield. A few plays later, Hippeard over threw his receiver and hit the field goal post only to be intercepted by linebacker Terence Moore. Shortly after, the Empire turned the ball over on downs giving the ball back to the Brigade on the short side of midfield. Two plays later Hippeard found Sims for a nine-yard score to tie the game 7-7.

The Empire took over on their own seven-yard line and Grady quickly found Jones who used his elusiveness to push the ball to midfield. After the quarter break, Grady found his favorite target Joe Hills for a 13 score. This touchdown marked the 87th consecutive game with a receiving touchdown for Hills. Albany failed to recover an onside kick setting up the Brigade with great field position on the opposing seven-yard line. One play later, Baltimore capitalized with a short touchdown to Brandon Thompkins.

Albany went back to work from their own seven-yard line and were quickly across midfield in one play thanks to an impressive diving catch by Jones. Two plays later, Jones found pay dirt for the second time of the half on a 17-yard pass from Grady.

Due to the Empire kickoff going out of bounds, Baltimore was set up on their own 20-yard line. Two plays later, Hippeard found receiver Milton Williams and the Brigade were quickly across midfield. The next play, Hippeard went right back to Williams, moving Baltimore into the red zone. Hippeard then found receiver Brandon Collins for the short touchdown as Collins held onto the ball while flipping over the wall.

After the drive started on their own two-yard line, Grady found receiver Collin Taylor for a 48-yard touchdown on the first play of the new possession to reclaim the lead 27-21 with only a minute remaining in the half. The Empire failed to recover another onside kick, setting the Brigade up on the six-yard line. Baltimore made quick work of the short field as Hippeard connected with Thompkins for a two-yard touchdown.

Baltimore successfully recovered an onside kick and went back to work on their own 11-yard line. Thanks to a successful challenge by Head Coach Rob Keefe, Moore forced and recovered a fumble one play later to get the ball back on the opposing 14-yard line. After three consecutive run plays to Jones and a kneel by Grady, Baltimore had burned through their timeouts. One play later, Grady found Jones once again for the six-yard score; Jones' third touchdown of the half. Baltimore returned the Empire kickoff and thanks to an unsportsmanlike penalty, were set up on the opposing 17-yard line. The Brigade ended the half with a 32-yard field goal to end the half still behind 33-31.

After a failed Brigade onside kick, the Empire went to work on the opposing 14-yard line. The Empire took their time burning away precious seconds on the clock. Grady then connected with Hills for his third touchdown of the game giving Albany a 61-46 lead with just over four minutes remaining in the game.

Collin Taylor recovered the Brigade onside kick attempt and the Empire offense took over on the 12-yard line with a minute remaining in the game. The Empire were quickly back in the red zone, but in no hurry to score. After three consecutive kneeldowns by Grady, the game was over, securing the Empire's fifth straight victory 61-53

Empire Win Fourth Straight

The Albany Empire (4-2) defeated the Washington Valor (0-6) 48-21 Saturday night at the Times Union Center in Albany, NY in front of a crowd of 7,847. Empire quarterback Tommy Grady threw for 237 yards and six touchdowns earning himself the game MVP award. Empire receiver Joe Hills had five receptions for 99 yards and three receiving touchdowns on his way to being named Offensive Player of the Game. The game marked the 86th consecutive game for Hills with a receiving touchdown; an active league record. Empire's jack linebacker Terence Moore was named Defensive Player of the Game with 8.5 total tackles and an interception return for a touchdown.

Washington received the game's opening kickoff and began their initial drive on their own five-yard line. After beginning with an incomplete pass, quarterback Shane Austin found receiver Reggie Gray for a quick five-yard pick up. The very next snap, Austin found Chris Duvall over the center of the field to push to ball closer to midfield. Two plays later, Austin was intercepted by Arthur Hobbs in the end zone to set the Empire up on their own five-yard line. The Empire opened the drive with a pass to rookie standout receiver Malachi Joes for an early first down. The next play, Grady connected with his top target Joe Hills for a long 30-yard touchdown to put Albany on top 7-0 midway through the first quarter.

The ensuing kickoff hit off the field goal post and was recovered by Jordan Williams, giving the ball back to the Empire on the opposing six-yard line. The first play of the new drive, fullback Wes Mauia couldn't haul in a pitch from Grady, fumbling the ball back to the Valor. Washington methodically worked the ball down the field and eventually capped their drive with an eight-yard touchdown to TT Toliver as he flipped over the back wall.

After a nice return by Jordan Williams, the Empire were set up on the 12-yard line. One play later, Grady found Jones deep in the end zone, but the play was erased by a penalty. Albany would bounce back as Grady hit Hills over the middle for an Empire first down as the first quarter came to a close. To open the second quarter, Grady connected with receiver Collin Taylor for a first down as Albany crossed midfield. One play later, Grady found Hills for a 17-yard Empire touchdown. After the Valor received the next kickoff, Jack Linebacker Terence Moore intercepted the first pass from Austin and returned the ball into the end zone to extend the Empire lead to two scores.

Starting from their own three-yard line, Austin found Reggie Gray for a quick 10-yard pick up. The ensuing play, Washington moved the ball through the air across midfield. After the play, Valor offensive lineman Will Corbin was ejected for a personal foul. After working the ball into the red zone, the Empire were able to stop Austin's scramble attempt from a yard out to force a turnover on downs. Albany would gain some space as Grady found Hills across the middle to quickly move the ball to midfield. After a couple of short completions to Taylor, Grady was able to hit Malachi Jones in the end zone from seven-yards out.

Wasting no time, the Valor returned the following kickoff all the way down field to the opposing seven-yard line setting them up with only 23 seconds remaining in the first half. Three plays later, Austin hooked up with receiver Josh Reese for a short score leaving only five seconds on the clock before halftime. On the final kickoff of the half, Valor receiver Jared Dangerfield was ejected for a personal foul. The Empire ran down the remaining seconds to end the first half with a 28-14 lead.

Empire quarterback Mike Fafaul entered the game for Grady late in the fourth quarter. After a Valor defensive penalty, the Empire were quickly over midfield and threatening again. Following the one-minute warning, Fafaul found Taylor as the Empire moved the ball inside of the Valor 15-yard line. The game was all but over as Fafaul took a knee and let the clock run out as the Empire won 48-21.

Empire Snap Soul's 20-Game Home Win Streak

The Albany Empire (3-2) defeated the Philadelphia Soul (3-2) 41-36 Saturday night at the Wells Fargo Center in Philadelphia, PA in front of a crowd of 9,715. The big win for the Empire broke the Soul's active streak of 20 consecutive wins at home. Empire quarterback Tommy Grady threw for 178 yards and five touchdowns earning himself the game MVP award. Empire receiver Malachi Jones had seven receptions for 63 yards and two receiving touchdowns, while chipping one rushing touchdown and earning himself Offensive Player of the Game for the second straight week. Soul's James Romain was named Defensive Player of the Game with eight total tackles and an interception.

The Soul received the initial kick and began their drive at their own five-yard line by opening with a 16-yard connection from Raudabaugh to Reynolds. Two plays later, the Soul found the end zone on a 27-yard hookup to Darius Prince to jump out to an early 7-0 lead.

Albany began their ensuing possession on their own five-yard line after a touchback on the kickoff. After a short completion to Joe Hills, the Empire were helped by a pass interference on fourth down to extend the drive. The drive was stalled by an interception by defensive back James Romain on a pass intended for Hills in the end zone. Three plays into the Soul drive, Raudabaugh was hit hard by a swarm of Empire defensive linemen and was temporarily knocked out of the game, leaving backup quarterback Greg McGhee to handle the next play. After giving up a sack to Empire lineman Nick Seither, Raudabaugh returned to the game. The Soul failed to convert on fourth down, turning the ball back over to Albany. At the end of the first quarter, Philadelphia led the defensive battle 7-0.

With the first play of the second quarter, the Empire were setback by an intentional grounding penalty on third down and were unable to convert on a long fourth down to give the ball back over to the Soul. Philadelphia worked quickly as they crossed into Empire territory in just two plays. Unable to convert another first down, the Soul attempted a long 46 field goal. The field goal was no good and returned by Empire receiver Collin Taylor to the five-yard line, but thanks to a Soul penalty, the Empire began their drive from the 15-yard line. Two plays later, Grady connected with Malachi Jones for a 30-yard touchdown to tie the game at 7-7.

Albany wasted no time after another Soul score as Grady connected with Jones for his second touchdown reception of the half to give the Empire a 14-13 lead. The Empire then failed to recover an onside kick of their own, setting up the Soul on the Albany 12-yard line. The Soul would take advantage of the short field by taking back the lead on a 27-yard field goal. With little time on the clock, the Empire couldn't find a way to score, with the first half ending 16-14 in favor of the Soul.

Albany would begin their second possession of the second half on their own 20-yard line after the Soul kickoff went out of bounds outside of the nets. Two plays later, Grady connected with Jordan Williams for a 25-yard touchdown; the first touchdown reception of Williams' young AFL career. The first play of the Soul's next possession ended with a fumble by fullback Adrian Ferns, giving the ball back to the Empire inside of the Soul 5-yard line. Defensive end Joe Sykes forced the fumble giving him a league leading four forced fumbles on the season. The Empire capitalized on the Soul turnover with a one-yard touchdown run by Malachi Jones to further the Albany lead. At the end of the third quarter, the Empire led 35-23.

To end the game, the Empire took over on the opposing six-yard line after a failed onside kick by the Soul with just under two minutes to go in the game. The Empire were unable to capitalize on the short field, giving the ball back to the Soul who then drove down field and capped with an eight-yard touchdown to Darius Prince to close the Empire gap to 41-36 with 33 seconds remaining. The Empire recovered the Soul onside kick attempt and were able to kneel the ball to run the remaining seconds on the clock and come away with a victory.

The Albany Empire (2-2) defeated the Washington Valor (0-4) 53-42, Friday night at the Capital One Arena in Washington, D.C. in front of a crowd of 9,036. Empire quarterback Tommy Grady threw for 257 yards and seven touchdowns earning himself the game MVP award. Empire receiver Malachi Jones had six receptions for 120 yards and three receiving touchdowns, while chipping one rushing touchdown and earning himself Offensive Player of the Game. Terence Moore was named Defensive Player of the Game with six total tackles and a fumble recovery.

The Empire received the opening kick and began their drive just inside the 10-yard line. With the first play of the game, Grady found Malachi Jones for a 41-yard bomb and a touchdown giving the Empire an early 6-0 lead. The Valor's Chris Duvalt returned the ensuing kickoff to nearly midfield, giving the Valor excellent field position for their first drive in their home opener. The Albany Empire (1-2) won their first game in franchise history against the Washington Valor (0-3) 47-23, Saturday night at the Times Union Center in front of a crowd of 10,065 wearing orange. Empire quarterback Tommy Grady threw for five touchdowns on his way to winning the game MVP award. Valors's Rod Windsor caught the two of the three Washington touchdown passes earning Offensive Player of the Game. Marrio Norman was named Defensive Player of the Game with two interceptions and a touchdown.

Albany receiving the opening kickoff and instantly found receiver Joe Hills on the first play of the game for a first down. On just the third play of the drive, Quarterback Tommy Grady threw a 25-yard floater that looked like it was intercepted, but the ball bobbed up into the hands of Hills for the touchdown. With the score, Joe Hills extended his record of consecutive games with a touchdown reception to 83.

To answer, the Washington Valor methodically drove the ball down the field. On fourth down in the red zone, Valor quarterback Warren Smith found Washington's top target Rod Windsor for the score. The Albany Empire (0-2) played the team's first game on the road in Baltimore and left with a loss to the Baltimore Brigade (2-1) 52-49, Saturday night at the Royal Farms Arena. Brigade quarterback Randy Hippeard threw for seven touchdowns on his way to winning the game MVP award. The Albany Empire (0-1) opened their inaugural season with a loss to the Philadelphia Soul (1-0), 56-35, Saturday night in front of a sold-out crowd at the Times Union Center. Soul quarterback Dan Raudabaugh, threw for six touchdowns on his way to winning the Offensive Player of the Game award. Torez Jones was named Defensive Player of the Game with five tackles, a fumble recovery and an interception.

After another Soul touchdown to answer, the Empire recovered a failed onside kick from Philadelphia, giving Albany great field position. The Empire capitalized with another hookup between Grady and Carr for six. To end the half, the Soul scored two touchdowns in the final minute, giving Philadelphia a 35-21 lead. At the end of the half, Grady had 132 passing yards for three touchdowns. His counterpart, Dan Raudabaugh, compiled 110 yards for four touchdowns.

After a halftime ceremony highlighted by the retirement of Albany Firebird legend "Touchdown" Eddie Brown's number 17, the Empire took the ball. Despite moving the ball downfield, Philadelphia forced a turnover on a backwards pass fumble from Grady. The Soul marched their way down for another score.

Down 42-21, The Empire made their way down the field in large part to a huge gain on the ground from fullback, Wes Mauia. The drive was completed with a short, six-yard touchdown pass from Grady to Doug McNeil III. The next Philadelphia drive ended with a missed field goal that bounced in play and was recovered for a Soul touchdown. The Empire wasted no time responding, tossing a 48-yard touchdown to receiver, Malachi Jones.

On a crucial driving being down by only two touchdowns midway through the fourth quarter, the Empire turned the ball over on downs on the opposing three-yard line. Philadelphia milked a lot of clock and moved the ball down field for another score, increasing their cushion to 21.

The Empire were unable to convert on their next possession, giving the ball back to Philadelphia. The Soul maintained control until the final seconds ticked off the clock. The final score of the game was 56-35.
